A WITNESS TO WAR AND PEACE!

99-Year-old Master Sgt Louis Graziano survived the third assault wave at Omaha Beach during the D-Day invasion, June 6, 1944. Less than one year later, he personally witnessed the German surrender. He is the last-known living witness to the German surrender in World War II. He is seated alongside a poster showing the cover of his memoir. "On the night before D-Day we had a prayer meeting, and that was one night everyone prayed."

At a schoolhouse in Reims, France, Gen. Alfred Jodl and the German High Command signed the terms of surrender. "General Eisenhower asked if they were satisfied with the proceedings. "They nodded their heads and clicked their heels together. He dismissed them and that was the end of that."

AN ERA IN HISTORY IS FAST FADING AWAY! LAST WWII MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENT HAS PASSED AT AGE 99!



The last surviving Medal of Honor recipient from World War II, who fought Japanese forces with a flamethrower on Iwo Jima in 1945 has passed. Hershel "Woody" Williams, a Marine Corps Corporal, died peacefully at a Veteran Medical Center in West Virginia that bears his name. Williams, the youngest of 11 Children, was born in 1923 in Quiet Dell, West Virginia. He was initially turned away from the armed forces because he was only 5 feet 6, but as the war raged on, the physical requirements were revised.

In 1943, he enlisted in the Marines, where he honed his skills with a flamethrower. Williams, then 22, was awarded the nation's highest honor for military valor by President Harry Truman after he used a flamethrower and explosives to clear seven concrete bunkers known as pillboxes while under heavy machine gunfire. As all of the men in Williams' company perished, he kept



pushing forward, at one point shoving a flamethrower nozzle into one of the pillboxes and killing the soldiers inside. He then refueled his weapon and returned five more times to destroy the remaining bunkers. "It wasn't anything outstanding that particular day," he once said, "it was just another day of battle as far as I was concerned. I was just the guy who was trained to do the flamethrower."

In March 2020, a military vessel was named in his honor, the USS HERSHEL "WOODY" WILLIAMS. The Veterans Hospital in West Virginia was also named for him. Flags in that state were ordered lowered to half-staff to honor Williams. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin said: "I hope every American will pause to reflect on his service and that of an entire generation that sacrificed so much to defend the cause of freedom and democracy."




At Ceremony In New Hampshire: GRANITE STATE CWV COMMANDERS ARE MEMORIALIZED ON GRANITE!



CWV POST PARTICIPATES IN "HONOR FLIGHT"

Mid-Hudson Honor Flight #827 took off from, and returned to, Stewart Airport in Newburgh, New York on October 8th, 2022. Among the Veterans on board were two members of Catholic War Veterans Joseph R. Farina Post #386. Honor Flights originate from all across the United States and transport surviving World War II and more recent Korean and Vietnam War Veterans for a day trip to Washington, D.C. Each is accompanied by an assigned aide and Honor Flight volunteers consisting of medical and administrative staff.

Since the first Honor Flight, several Post #386 members have participated, including several World War II Veterans now deceased. During the trip, the Veterans are provided a bagged lunch and dinner. They are bused to the World War II, Korean and Vietnam War Memorials, Arlington National Cemetery, the Marine Corps raising of the Flag at the Iwo Jima Memorial, and cruise past the White House, Pentagon and Washington Monument before returning home.

Every day is Memorial Day at McSorley's Old Ale House in New York City. For more than 100 years, one of Manhattan's oldest saloons has been a reminder of the last meal enjoyed by young American men before they were killed in Europe in World War I.

As men were drafted, McSorley's would treat the guys who were regular customers to a turkey dinner before they departed for Europe. After the dinner, they would take the wishbone and hang it on a fixture, consisting of a pipe suspended between two light bulbs, which makes it a perfect hook on which to hang a turkey wishbone.

for the war heroes who left them there. Unfortunately, they were recently cleaned in 2011, and only upon orders of city

health inspectors. Late owner Matthew Maher did the dishonor himself. "Nobody wanted to touch them. It was like erasing our history," said his daughter Teresa who now runs the tavern.

Perhaps one of the nation's most visible WWI memorials is not far from McSorley's. Father Francis P. Duffy rose to fame for fearlessness in combat in World War I as he cared for the wounded and dying. His heroics earned citations for bravery from both the U.S. and French governments. He later became a spiritual leader in Midtown Manhattan, as Pastor of nearby Holy Cross Church. His exploits were portrayed by actor Pat O'Brien in the 1940 Hollywood production, "The Fighting 69th."





Victorious soldiers and sailors found their way back to the neighborhood after the armistice ending the war was signed on November 11, 1918. These service members would, according to pub legend, remove a wishbone as a token of their safe return—and break it with the bartender. Names of the men who hung the bones above the bar were never recorded. Some were presumably killed in battlefields such as Belleau Wood, Soissons or Saint-Mihiel. People who come into the bar are really touched by the sight.

Nearly two dozen wishbones still hang in the light fixture above the bar. While customers are touched, the dust-covered wishbones are not, out of respect








